



FEATURES OF THE WORKPLACE LEARNING PROGRAM



One-week placement in industry of study.



Students are supervised by an employer.



Students enhance skills learned in their course & classroom.



Students are instructed and shown how to perform basic tasks.



Full insurance from the education system is provided and follow up of students is by South West Connect.



Courses are recognised by both industry and the NSW Education Standards Authority. South West Connect coordinates all placements for students in Fairfield, Liverpool and Merrylands.

SWC SUPPORTS WORK PLACEMENT STAKEHOLDERS IN THE FOLLOWING WAYS:



Students are supported throughout their 2 year VET course and can access a range of resources on the SWC website. SWC provides 'Work Placement Ready' sessions and mock interviews prior to the placement. SWC ensures students settle in well at the workplace and gain a meaningful experience relevant to their course.



Employers are assigned a Business Development Consultant and an Employer Liaison Consultant who provides assistance with every aspect of the work placement process. Dedicated Work Placement Officers contact the host employer before, during and after the placement. They also are a main point of contact for any issues arising during the placement.



Teachers are supported throughout the year by SWC including VET Advisory meetings held each term. SWC sources and administers work placements on behalf of the school. VET teachers have a dedicated Work Placement Officer who is the conduit between the school and the host employers, providing prompt and effective support throughout the student's work placement.



Parents and Carers can access the Parents & Carers Guide to Workplace Learning before their child attends work placement. This contains important information about preparing for a positive and realistic work placement experience.



Each year, SWC coordinates and monitors approximately 6,000 work placements for students from 39 high schools from Government, Non-Government and 3 TAFE colleges. **SWC covers** both Industry Curriculum Courses (ICC) and various Board Endorsed Courses (BEC).

SWC works with Education and Industry to provide work placement opportunities for Year 11 and 12 students in the Fairfield, Liverpool and Cumberland City Council (Local Government Areas) who are studying Vocational Education and Training (VET) courses as part of their HSC.

Work placement is a way of preparing senior school students for employment. Students studying VET courses as part of their Higher School Certificate (HSC) are given the opportunity

to learn practical skills through experience and practise in the workplace. ICC and BEC include a component of mandatory work placement hours.

VET courses allow students to begin their industry training at the same time as studying for their HSC. It offers students a unique opportunity to practise what they have learned in the classroom and to experience the real world of work.

SWC has been an active member of the Youth Futures Network (YFN) for the past 5 years. Previously called the Workplace Learning Network (WLN) it was re-branded to YFN to better reflect the scope and reach of the network and its members. The YFN is an association comprised of 16 organisations with a business model that focuses on the youth of NSW.

In addition to being a service provider of the Workplace Learning program, the network members have delivered a variety of workplace programs and services to schools, industry and communities in their regions for over 15 years.



The YFN provides opportunities for students to obtain the skills and workplace learning experiences they require to make sound personal, educational and vocational choices to ensure they have the best chance of thriving in the workplace in the future.

YFN members are unencumbered by alliances to out of region influences ensuring the management is local, the staff is local and the services are local.



VIRTUAL WORK PLACEMENT (CANLEY VALE HIGH SCHOOL) SALESFORCE - BUSINESS SERVICES

In an exciting new initiative, 10 students from Canley Vale High School recently embarked on a transformative, virtual work placement journey with 'Salesforce'. This placement opportunity was delivered by Salesforce in collaboration with the Department of Education and coordinated by The Youth Partnership.

It presented a weeklong workplace simulation for over five hundred students across NSW. This opportunity not only expanded their understanding of real-world business operations but also proved to be a pivotal step towards shaping their future career aspirations.

The virtual simulation work placement was designed to mimic a professional sales environment, showcasing the remarkable benefits of group collaboration.

The active involvement on Wednesday the 9th of August from Salesforce representatives, Alice, and Jason, added an invaluable dimension to the students' learning experience. Their presence bridged the gap between theory and practice, offering real-world insights and industry perspectives.

Interacting with these professionals provided students with firsthand knowledge of sales strategies, customer engagement, and negotiation techniques. This personalised interaction

not only heightened the authenticity of the simulation but also allowed students to gain mentorship from experienced sales representatives.

Team collaboration proved essential, pushing students beyond comfort zones while refining communication abilities for the group presentations which were completed on Friday afternoon.

As these students move forward in their educational and professional journeys, the skills they have gained and the challenges they have conquered will undoubtedly serve as a strong foundation for their future success.

FROM WORK PLACEMENT TO PAID EMPLOYMENT



John Edmondson High School students recently enjoyed a unique learning experience during a two-day Class Chefs event hosted by Bellbird Dining & Bar. Guided by Bellbird Dining employees Amber Vastag and Gabrielle Binay, these students crafted a sumptuous degustation menu featuring six exquisite tasting plates and beverages.

Remarkably, just a year ago, Amber and Gabrielle were in a similar position as work placement students at the same establishment. Their journey from students to skilled professionals is an inspiring tale of growth and opportunity. During the Class Chefs event, they shared their expertise with 15 eager students from the Year 11 & 12 VET Hospitality class, covering essential skills for managing both kitchen operations and front-of-house responsibilities.

The event was a resounding success, garnering immense praise from the 68 guests who attended. Many expressed their astonishment at the high quality of the fine dining experience, especially considering it was delivered by students.

His leadership ensured a flawless execution of the two-day event.

This incredible opportunity stemmed from the one-week work placements organised by SWC at Bellbird Dining & Bar the previous year. Amber's outstanding skills, positive attitude, and eagerness to learn during her placement earned her an apprenticeship in the kitchen, setting her on the path to becoming a chef. Gabrielle, recognised for her excellent customer service and strong work ethic, secured a part-time position in the front-of-house team.

This collaboration not only provided practical experience for the students but also opened doors to rewarding career paths for dedicated individuals like Amber and Gabrielle.

Bellbrid Dining is located at Casula Powerhouse Arts Centre, the venue of many past SWC Youth Mental Health Summits, they are part of Liverpool City Council and a popular work placement host.

The consistent message from Host Employers in recent years highlights the challenges in hiring qualified staff, exacerbated by the COVID-19 lockdowns.

The 2022 Workforce Skills Survey by Business NSW, the state's leading business organization, revealed that over 90% of businesses are facing workforce shortages. efficiency and employee satisfaction.

"THE BUSINESS COMMUNITY IN NSW IS FACING ITS MOST SIGNIFICANT WORKFORCE CHALLENGE IN MORE THAN 50 YEARS," SAID BUSINESS NSW CHIEF EXECUTIVE DANIEL HUNTER.

Mr. Hunter points out, "The survey results emphasize that this is a widespread issuenearly half the businesses find it just as hard to fill entry-level positions as it is to find experienced staff." This pattern of staffing shortages across various sectors seems set to continue for some time.

For businesses looking to expand their pool of potential talent, hosting a work placement student offers a valuable solution. It allows young individuals to translate their academic skills into a real-world context. By assigning basic tasks to work placement students, companies can free up their current staff to concentrate on more complex duties, thereby enhancing overall efficiency and job satisfaction.

Additionally, this arrangement offers existing employees chances to develop management and training skills. A one-week work placement for a VET student benefits not just the business and the student, but also the broader economy by providing practical workplace experience. This initiative is a positive step towards addressing the skills shortage crisis in numerous industries.

Class Chefs is a student restaurant takeover initiative created by South West Connect (SWC) in 2012, and has been funded by Regional Education Industry Partnership (RIEP) since 2019.

Class Chefs gives a group of up to 30 students the chance to run a restaurant for the day. They plan, cook, prepare and serve a 3 course fine dining experience (or 6 tasting plates) for up to 120 paying customers within a 3 hour session comparable to some of the busiest restaurants in the city.

Under the guidance of the restaurant staff and the SWC team, high school students aspiring a career in hospitality will get a hands-on experience in all aspects of running a restaurant, front and back of house. Class Chefs allows students to

experience working under pressure, demonstrate strong communication, outstanding teamwork, workplace time management and problem-solving skills. These skills are often difficult to demonstrate or master in the classroom yet are crucial in the workplace.

The Class Chefs format surpasses a traditional 'watch and follow' learning process, instead allowing students to take the lead, gain real life, commercial experience and work practices. This is a vital link to industry that students require to succeed beyond the classroom or training environment.

The longevity and effectiveness of the Class Chefs initiative is a result of the contribution of all supporters of the program since 2012, thank you.



PROJECT CARE is an aged and youth empowerment volunteer program and bridges the cultural and generational gap and promotes careers and volunteering in aged care and healthcare. Westfields Sports High School (WSHS) students volunteered to interact and support aged care residents who were significantly impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic lockdown restrictions. SummitCare and WSHS followed COVIDSafe practices and Influenza vaccination protocols to ensure a safe and memorable experience.

Project CARE is an aged and youth empowerment volunteer program for high school students. The program bridges the cultural and generational gap and promotes careers and volunteering in aged care and healthcare. Project CARE encourages, supports and increases participation in volunteering at an early age and assists students in making the transition from school to work while enhancing their employability skills.

Since the first FUSION / Project CARE session in 2014, over 410 students have taken part in the program from the following high schools: Westfields Sports High School, Canley Vale, Prairiewood,

Liverpool Boys, Miller Technology and Bossley Park. More than 200 aged care residents have benefited from the regular interaction with young people in the Project CARE program.

Funding for the majority of Project CARE programs has been made possible through the contribution of our local clubs and the NSW ClubGRANTS scheme. SWC would like to take the opportunity to thank Cabra-Vale Diggers Club, Fairfield RSL, Mounties Group, Club Marconi and St Johns Park Bowling Club for their ongoing support of this project that connects cultures & generations and provides employment pathways through volunteering in aged care.







DARE TO DREAM BIG JOURNEY

SOCIAL & EMOTIONAL LEARNING EARLY INTERVENTION PROGRAM

TRANSITION TO HIGH SCHOOL **PROGRAM**

The SWC Dare to Dream Big program is a social & emotional learning (SEL) early intervention program that works with primary schools to support children's motivation and aspirations to become engaged in meaningful activities and career education. It also supports children to acquire skills for success to successfully transition through different life stages and to handle related social and emotional challenges.



graduated from the Transition to High School program

In 2022, over 170 students took part in the Dare to Dream Big's extension Transition to High School Program to learn about educational and career pathways, managing workload, coping with stress, support networks, employability skills, and skill for success in the future.

The need to prepare and give confidence to primary school students to transition to high school derived from many meetings with teachers and executive teams from various schools which identified a heightened level of anxiety from students about to transition to high school.

Students have shown improvement in their conflict resolution skills and require less teacher intervention in social disagreements in the classroom and playground. In particular, the boys have been involved in less physical altercations.





"Generations Connect" improves the selfesteem, physical and mental health of the elderly and year 5/6 students. The project promotes volunteering in the health/aged care industry at an early age and helps students develop resilience, wellbeing, & leadership. COVID-19 increased social isolation of aged residents, and this project aims to alleviate this by facilitating regular meaningful interaction between students and aged residents who may not have family members or visitors.







PROJECT CARE (PS

(PS & HS)

Project CARE is an aged and youth empowerment volunteer program for primary and high school students. Project CARE encourages, supports and increases participation in volunteering at an early age and assists students in making the transition from school to work while enhancing their employability skills. It also enhances empathy, bridges the generational gap, improves community connectedness and social inclusion.

AMBITION AMBITION + PLUS (HS)

Ambition PLUS is an immersive careersfocused program that aims to help students
learn skills and knowledge to improve all
aspects of their lives. The program provides
tools and resources for students to grow
their current skill set and discover career
pathways that suit their interests and
passions. Students also receive free access
to an online careers resource tool,
'thecareersdepartment.com', and online
subscription 'Happpow' (Gianna Lucas) for
12 months.



Class Chefs is an unique event allowing High School Hospitality VET students to gain real life, commercial experience and work practices. For one night only, students take over the restaurant to create a delicious 3 course menu with the support of the Head Chef.

FLFR comprises of multiple layers of activities with young leaders and their peers to train them to build resilience and life skills in lifting their aspirations and empowering them with the confidence to succeed during and after school. SWC also provides a tailored program to benefit primary school students. A Career Immersion bus tour consolidates the skills and knowledge gained and is applied in a practical setting.

VETSUMMIT EXPLORE LEARN APPLY ACHIEVE

VET STUDENT CAREERS SUMMIT (HS)

The VET Students Careers Summit provides students studying a Vocational Education & Training (VET) course an opportunity to acquire skills and knowledge from Industry Experts. The event will help them get the most out of their work placements by being mentored and interacting with Industry experts throughout the day. Sessions include interactive Career Workshops, VET Industry Q&A Panel, Pop-up Stalls, and Speed Careers Mentoring.



The Youth Wellbeing Success Summit connects school communities (students, teachers and parents) to wellbeing resources. Join a vibrant group of 600 students, educators, service providers, and inspirational leaders for a fun day filled with enriching masterclasses, immersive workshops, and dynamic interactive sessions.



Over the past six months, South West Connect (SWC) and the Australian Museum (AM) have developed a strategy to actively engage local youth.



YOUTH WELLBEING SUCCESS SUMMIT

As a prominent cultural and scientific institution, the Australian Museum played a vital role in the Youth Wellbeing Success Summit, contributing as a Service Provider. Melissa Malu, Manager of Pasifika Collections and Engagement, was a key guest speaker, highlighting the role of identity and belonging in the wellbeing and success of diverse youth.

The summit was an opportunity for schools to connect with local service providers. The Australian Museum's Speed Wellbeing Networking sessions were particularly impactful, offering students a chance to engage deeply with the AM team and gain insights and resources.

MOVING FORWARD

SWC and the AM are excited to continue this partnership, aiming to positively influence young lives in our community. We anticipate that this collaboration will not only benefit the students but also strengthen ties between SWC and the AM, as well as the broader South West Sydney and Pacific communities.

ASPIRATIONAL FUTURE LINKS TOUR TRATIONAL A TRANSITION TO HIGH SCHOOL PROGRAM

Building on this success, SWC and the AM are co-facilitating a high school transition program scheduled for December 2023 at the Australian Museum. This program will bring Year 6 students, particularly from refugee backgrounds in South West Sydney, on an aspirational city tour. The visit to the AM will include an educational session led by their First Nations team and SWC, focusing on essential skills for transitioning to high school such as self-confidence, goal setting, and teamwork. Additionally, students will explore the museum's diverse collections, gaining insights into Australian and Pacific history, culture, and science.

This initiative aims to bolster students' sense of identity, belonging, and aspiration, while nurturing their curiosity and critical thinking. The goal is to inspire them to pursue their interests and embrace the opportunities high school and beyond offer.

The Australian Museum has generously provided funding for the transportation and lunch for the students and teachers.

PROPOSED INITIATIVE FOR 2024: ELEVATING POSSIBILITIES, INSPIRING CONFIDENCE (E.P.I.C.)

Collaborating with the Australian Museum's First Nations team, E.P.I.C. fosters participation of Pasifika, Indigenous, and CALD refugee youth. Prioritising resilience, well-being, and agency, E.P.I.C. utilises role models and supportive networks to amplify success. Emphasising empowerment and identity, E.P.I.C. nurtures community connections and involves youth in project planning and evaluation. E.P.I.C, through captivating workshops, mentorship, and communal activities, endeavors to uplift the potential of participants and instill confidence.



Since 2006, SWC has been in a productive partnership with the NSW Department of Education (DoE), facilitating over 77,000 student work placements. Collaborating closely with Business & Industry, SWC plays a pivotal role in aiding young individuals in their transition to the workforce.

One of our key initiatives, the RIEP is designed to bridge the gap between academic learning and real-world industry requirements. RIEP enables students to acquire job-relevant skills by integrating school learning with workplace demands.

Additionally, the Department of Education's Ready Arrive Work (RAW) initiative recently organized a career expo at Fairfield RSL. This event was part of their ongoing efforts to assist refugee students in our region.

Targeting recent refugees, the RAW program focuses on enhancing employability skills and providing insights into the dynamic Australian job market. The expo, attended by students from various Western Sydney high schools, featured inspiring talks from successful professionals who were once in similar situations, including Shaun Christie-David, the owner of establishments like Colombo Social.

SWC supported this valuable initiative by inviting our network of host employers and organizations to participate in the expo. Our presence at the event underscores our commitment to such impactful programs, contributing to the development and empowerment of the youth in our communities.

EDUCATIONAL PATHWAYS PROGRAM





Education

SWC has been involved with the EPP since the pilot launched in late 2019, our focus includes two main programs: the "EDGE for Work" workshops and the **Careers Immersion Teams (CIT)**. In collaboration with CIT Head Teachers, (Joyce Choucair and Olga Gromof, now Nicholas Chambour) SWC is dedicated to forging strong industry connections and creating synergies, particularly within the Liverpool and Cowpasture clusters. This collaboration aims to offer students valuable insights and opportunities in their career development journey. CIT Head Teachers have been instrumental in organising EPP students to attend many SWC events including the SWC VET Summit and Ambition PLUS.

Previously called the EDGE for Work sessions, and now renamed **Job Readiness Workshops**, delivered by EY (an international professional services firm) is now the sole service provider tasked with conducting these workshops across all 148 EPP schools in NSW.

The workshops are designed to offer students practical advice and inspiration for their first job and to encourage exploration of vocational career options. These sessions aim to familiarise students with the workplace through engaging, hands-on activities. Conducted in schools, they cover a range of topics from interview preparation to grooming and dressing for success.

The Educational Pathway Program (EPP) has been the greatest support we, as a school, have had in addressing the changing climate of our school, especially through their expert staff who come to school to help out. We have an increasing number of students who do not want to go to university; so EPP has helped us to provide VET exploration opportunities for students and parent, work-ready programs, and has really improved our community's understanding of job opportunities.

AWS GIRLS' TECH DAY & WORK PLACEMENTS

South West Connect, partnered with Schools Industry Partnerships to recruit schools in Region E to attend the 'Girls Tech Day'. An annual event funded and hosted by Amazon Web Services (AWS) in collaboration with Inspiring the Future Australia.

SWC will be part of the pre and post event journey to inspire and motivate girls and young women to pursue interests and career pathways in science, technology, engineering, arts, and mathematics (STEAM).

From artificial intelligence to the metaverse, female students in both primary and high school are involved in a hands on, engaging day surrounded by female role models in the industry. Taking place at the Campbelltown Convention & Entertainment Centre, the event is free and funding for buses offered to some schools.



Amazon Web Services (AWS) and AWS Educate hosted students from across NSW in a Virtual Work Placement for the Information, Design and Technology course.

As part of this collaboration, students worked in teams with AWS Mentors who are world leaders in cloud computing technology and artificial intelligence (AI). With their mentors, students developed a ChatBot computer program that simulates human conversation through voice or text command using AI technology.

Thank you to Schools Industry Partnerships for coordinating this innovative and highly relevant solution and also thanks to the AWS staff who were able to demonstrate how the industry is working remotely and also provide a high-quality workplace learning experience.



ESAFETY IN THE DIGITAL AGE

CONNECTING UP CONFERENCE

In today's digital age, eSafety has become a paramount concern for students, families, and communities worldwide. The digital landscape offers numerous benefits, but it also brings along a multitude of risks. These risks were raised by **Julie Inman Grant, Australia's eSafety Commissioner**, at the Connecting Up Conference this year in which SWC had the privilege to attend.



The conference was attended by 300 not for profit organisations from across Australia. Covering masterclasses, keynote presentations, panel discussions led by industry experts, and informative plenaries showcasing research and expertise in a wide range of areas including IT strategy, cyber security, leadership, capability building and training, digital marketing, and fundraising.

Among the many interesting and engaging sessions was an inspiring presentation "Breaking the bias: designing for equity and opportunity" by **Ally Watson OAM, Code Like A Girl.**



COURLING A SINL

SWC has a strong and proud history of hosting expos for 18,900 students over the past decade. Ranging from large scale events for 3,300 high schools students held across 3 days at the "Try a Trade" expos and the "Mega Seek A Skill" expos, down to the smaller scale "Mini Seek a Skill" events for 100 - 300 primary school students.

These expos are interactive, offering students the chance to engage with adult volunteers from various professions, trades, and industries. Participants gain insights into different skills essential for success in any career and explore various pathways to fulfilling employment.

Over the years, SWC has stepped away from "traditional" expos that are hosted by other providers throughout the state. Through a consultation process since 2012 with many principals, teachers, students, parents and industry experts, the feedback strongly indicated the need for value added, interactive workshops, masterclasses and speed networking sessions. As a result, SWC now hosts impactful and engaging events including the VET Summit, Ambition PLUS and the Wellbeing Summit. These were designed to mirror the professional learning and development that professional delegates receive at annual conferences.

CAREERS MARKET & SOUTH WEST SYDNEY APPRENTICESHIP & TRAINEESHIP EXPO

Since 2017, SWC has formed a collaborative partnership with Brett Carter Events (BCE) to enhance the visibility and engagement of the Careers Market and the Apprenticeship & Traineeship Expo in Region E.

BCE reported that in May 2023, more than 5,000 students from 50 schools attended the Careers Market, where they engaged with 150 exhibitors to delve into various post-school options.

These options included apprenticeships, traineeships, employment providers, universities, TAFE institutions, and private education providers.

Additionally, the South West Sydney Apprenticeship & Traineeship Expo saw an impressive turnout of over 4,000 participants. This event was part of a larger series, with a cumulative attendance of 25,000 individuals across six events.

Introducing students in Years 3 to 6 to a wide array of career possibilities, particularly through events featuring diverse role models, boosts their engagement in class. They begin to understand how their school lessons can be applied in real-world careers.


